BLACK SWALLOWTAIL

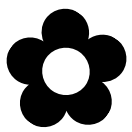


- Woodland/shade gardens
- Blooms white, May-June
- Roots & leaves have a licorice (anise) aroma when crushed
- Historically used in remedies

FUN FACTS:

Long narrow seeds may stick to clothing/fur. Leaves used in salad. Roots can be a fennel seed substitute. Harvest in spring.

COMPANIONS: Blue Cohosh, Wild Ginger, Solomon's Seal, Trillium, Columbine, Violets, Virginia Bluebells, Ferns, Jacob's Ladder, Wild Blue Phlox, Wood Poppy



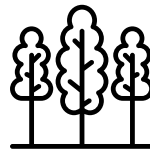
