


- Native to upland thickets/prairies
- Blooms white/lavender, July-Aug
- Noticeably hairy leaves & stems
- Nectar rich flowers for pollinators
- AKA Whorled Mountain Mint

HELPFUL TIPS:

Leaves may be affected by rust or turn yellow & drop in extreme heat/dry weather. Usually a temporary problem.

COMPANIONS: Tall Meadow Rue, New York Ironweed, Cutleaf Coneflower, Milkweed, Switchgrass, Grass-Leaved Goldenrod, Meadow Beauty, Blue-Eyed Grass, Pussytoes
